## Facts About Emory's Diversity

- For the Fall 2003 semester, minority enrollment at Emory is 24.8 percent.  
(Emory University Office of the Registrar)
- For the Fall 2003 semester, black enrollment at Emory is 10.5 percent.

- For the Fall 2003 semester, minority faculty members constituted 23.39 percent of the total faculty.  
(Emory University Affirmative Action Plan, 2004)
- Emory has consistently ranked at or near the top of the Journal of Blacks in Higher Education's (JBHE) survey of student and faculty diversity at the nation's highest-ranked universities. Here are the highlights:
  - ✓ Emory has the third largest percentage of black students among the nation's 26 leading universities. (JBHE Autumn 2003)
  - ✓ Since 1980, Emory has shown the largest increase in black enrollment of any of the highest-ranked universities.
  - ✓ In JBHE's 1996 survey of the percentage of black faculty at the nation's highest-ranked universities, Emory ranked first. Blacks made up 5 percent of the total full-time faculty at Emory.
  - ✓ In JBHE's 2002 survey of the percentage of black faculty at the nation's highest-ranked universities, Emory ranked second to Columbia. Blacks made up 6.9 percent of the total full-time faculty at Emory, one of top three in nation, except for predominantly black schools.
  - ✓ In JBHE's 2002 rankings of African American racial diversity at the nation's highest-ranked universities, Emory ranked second to Duke. Emory finished first in total black enrollments and second in three other categories: black faculty, five-year gain in black faculty, and five-year progress in tenured black faculty.
  - ✓ In 2002, 12.9 percent of the students at Emory's medical school were black. This was the nation's highest percentage of black students among the nation's 26 highest-ranked medical schools.
  - ✓ In JBHE's 2002 survey of tenured faculty at the nation's highest-ranked universities, Emory finished third to Columbia and Brown, with blacks making up 3.8 percent of the tenured faculty.

- Black Issues in Higher Education ranked Emory #40 out of the top 100 institutions for the number of full-time Hispanic faculty.

- Emory ranked #17 in Black Enterprise Magazine's Top 50 Colleges for African-American students. Previous ranking was #16 in the January 1999 edition.
